Introduction

The NEW W.O.R.L.D.S. initiative continues its vital work in supporting the reintegration of women victims of trafficking (VoT). This factsheet provides updates on recent project activities, focusing on the creation of the Toolkit on Effective Reintegration Measures by ISMU, highlights from the second exchange visit in Athens, and the upcoming guide by IASIS.

Upcoming Plans

- 1. Toolkit Piloting and Training** Each partner (FTDA, ISMU, SURT, IASIS) will pilot the toolkit by the end of June 2024, with data analysis by July 15, 2024. Training on the toolkit will begin in October 2024 for social workers and professionals.
- 2. National Workshops** A series of workshops will be held in each partner country to disseminate the Reintegration Toolkit and train local stakeholders.
- 3. Exchange Visit in Barcelona** Scheduled for October 8-11, 2024, this visit will focus on employer engagement and developing sustainable employment pathways.

Toolkit on Effective Reintegration Measures

ISMU has spearheaded the development of a comprehensive Toolkit on Effective Reintegration Measures for women VoT. This toolkit aims to provide best practices and methodological guidance for professionals working in the field.

The toolkit is intended to be a methodological tool available to anti-trafficking organizations to collect data on VoT inclusion processes, in order to improve the services provided and implement any possible good practice. The development of this tool is based on the elements gathered during the research carried out during the first year of the project. The research revealed good practices carried out in the partners' territories but also critical factors in the implementation of VoTs integration programs. Starting from these aspects, a set of qualitative and quantitative indicators was constructed to measure the real effectiveness of inclusion pathways. This set of indicators is intended to enable organizations to reflect on their ability to respond appropriately to the needs of VoTs. In the forthcoming months, the toolkit will be tested by anti-trafficking agencies in each country.

Toolkit Objectives

The toolkit provides a set of quantitative and qualitative indicators to evaluate the effectiveness of reintegration programs. It draws on input collected during the first exchange visit and ongoing project activities to offer practical guidelines and strategies for the socio-economic inclusion of VoT women.

NEW WORLDS in GREECE

Highlights from the Second Exchange Visit in Athens

The second exchange visit, held from April 17-19, 2024, facilitated important discussions and activities among project partners. Key highlights include:

- Discussion on Podcasts: Partners reviewed and provided feedback on podcast scripts aimed at raising awareness and sharing project insights.
- Study Visit to Red Umbrella Athens (RUA): Participants learned about RUA's empowerment center for sex workers and their comprehensive support services.
- Presentation of the Toolkit Questionnaire: Finalization of the toolkit questionnaire through collaborative working groups, ensuring it meets the needs of all partners.
- IASIS Service "Hypatia": Presentation of IASIS's empowerment services for women, addressing personal, social, and professional development.

Guide on Non-Conventional Psychotherapeutic and Counseling Tools by IASIS

IASIS, an expert in mental health issues, is developing a Guide on non-conventional psychotherapeutic and counseling tools. This guide is designed for professionals who work with survivors of trafficking and will incorporate art-based methodologies. The guide will be piloted with operators and beneficiaries and translated into English, French, Spanish, Greek, and Italian for broader dissemination at the EU level.
